

- $S_p(\vec{w}) = -\nabla_{\vec{w}}U$
- $S(\vec{x}_u) = -\nabla_{\vec{x}_u} U = -U_u = \vec{x}_u + \vec{x}_v$
- $S(\vec{x}_v) = -\nabla_{\vec{x}_v} U = -U_v = \vec{x}_u + \vec{x}_v$ Example: x(u, v) = (u, v, 0)



Shape Operator of Cylinder







- $S(\vec{x}_u) = -\nabla_{\vec{x}_u} U = -U_u$ write it in the basis of $\vec{x}_u + \vec{x}_v$
- $S(\vec{x}_v) = -\nabla_{\vec{x}_v} U = -U_v$ write it in the basis of $\vec{x}_u + \vec{x}_v$ Example: $x(u, v) = (r \cos u, r \sin u, v)$, with r constant $x_u = (-r \sin u, r \cos u, 0)$

$$x_v = (0, 0, 1)$$

$$U=(\cos u,\sin u,0)$$


$$S(\vec{x}_u) = -U_u = -(-\sin u, \cos u, 0) = -\frac{1}{r}x_u + 0x_v$$


$$S(\vec{x}_v) = -U_v = (0,0,0) = 0x_u + 0x_v$$

$$\begin{bmatrix} -\frac{1}{r} & 0 \\ 0 & 0 \end{bmatrix}$$



Shape Operator of Sphere








Example: $x(u, v) = (\operatorname{sech} u \cos v, \operatorname{sech} u \sin v, u - \tanh u)$
 $S(\vec{x}_{u}) = -\frac{1}{\sinh u}\vec{x}_{u} + 0\vec{x}_{v}$
 $S(\vec{x}_{v}) = 0\vec{x}_{u} + \sinh u\vec{x}_{v}$
 $\begin{bmatrix} -\frac{1}{\sinh u} & 0 \\ 0 & \sinh u \end{bmatrix}$

Shape Operator of $u^2 - v^2$ Saddle










Example: $x(u, v) = (u, v, u^2 - v^2)$

$$S(\vec{x}_u) = \frac{8v^2 + 2}{(1 + 4u^2 + 4v^2)^{\frac{3}{2}}} \vec{x}_u + \frac{8vu}{(1 + 4u^2 + 4v^2)^{\frac{3}{2}}} \vec{x}_v$$

$$S(\vec{x}_v) = \frac{-8vu}{(1 + 4u^2 + 4v^2)^{\frac{3}{2}}} \vec{x}_u + -\frac{8u^2 + 2}{(1 + 4u^2 + 4v^2)^{\frac{3}{2}}} \vec{x}_v$$

$$S(\vec{X}_{\nu}) = \frac{-8\nu u}{(1+4u^2+4\nu^2)^{\frac{3}{2}}} \vec{X}_{u} + -\frac{8u^2+2}{(1+4u^2+4\nu^2)^{\frac{3}{2}}} \vec{X}_{\nu}$$

$$\begin{bmatrix} \frac{8v^2 + 2}{(1 + 4u^2 + 4v^2)^{\frac{3}{2}}} & \frac{8vu}{(1 + 4u^2 + 4v^2)^{\frac{3}{2}}} \\ \frac{-8vu}{(1 + 4u^2 + 4v^2)^{\frac{3}{2}}} & -\frac{8u^2 + 2}{(1 + 4u^2 + 4v^2)^{\frac{3}{2}}} \end{bmatrix}$$






Fig. 3. Shape operator (left) and polynomial fit-derived (right) magnitude of curvature on the inner skull surface. Note that the shape operator is sensitive enough to assign high curvature to small structures, such as the vessel impressions on the inner skull surface. The polynomial-fit curvature image was processed with surface-constrained smoothing, to reduce noise, while the shape operator curvature did not require smoothing.
